Welcome to the latest issue of The Voice, Kisimul's quarterly newsletter.

I have always viewed September's arrival with a sense of optimism, taking the opportunity to reset after the summer and look ahead to a new season. This September has been particularly significant, as we begin to introduce our Meaningful Life model across Kisimul's Adult services.

In preparation for this change, I felt it was important that we review the pay we offer to our colleagues - recognising their fantastic contributions to the business and acknowledging the wider economic landscape. For so many of us, the cost-of-living crisis is having a significant impact on our day-to-day lives and I feel strongly that, as an employer, Kisimul should take steps to support the people who do so much for us through this difficult time.

With that in mind, I'm thrilled to share that we have increased our pay award. Going forward, we will introduce a standard pay table across both Children's and Adult care, with an increase to our starting rate for Life Practitioners and a 3% increase to new pay scales across the board. These changes will mean that all colleagues within Children's and Adult care will have the opportunity for greater career and pay progression.

To promote these exciting developments to potential new recruits, we have invested in a marketing campaign which we hope will attract applicants and allow us to continue to grow.

Meanwhile, my congratulations to Acacia Hall for being recognised with a 'Good' rating from Ofsted, and to St Mary's who also received a 'Good' rating in all areas following recent Care Quality Commission (CQC)

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A 'Good' time to be a resident at St Mary's


As the independent regulator for health and social care in England, the Care Quality Commission (CQC) is responsible for ensuring services provide people with safe, effective, compassionate, high-quality care. Following inspections carried out earlier this year, we are thrilled to share that our newest service, St Mary's in Surbiton, has been rated 'Good' in all areas by the body.

In its report, the CQC said: "People were involved in planning their care and received care how they preferred, such as personal care and their choice of meals. People were supported to be as independent as they were able and wanted to be."

"Staff spoke about people kindly and it was clear they understood people's needs and preferences well.

A relative told us, '[My family member] seems to be happy and content. The staff are all very attentive and very caring. They seem to understand her and her needs."'

At Kisimul, we want the people we support to be as happy and healthy as they can be. That's why we've launched a new physical health campaign which sees us focusing on a different aspect of health and wellbeing every month. We're sharing relevant information and resources relating to each topic with colleagues and will be measuring our success with an audit of interim outcomes early next year.

To kick off the initiative, we encouraged everyone over the age of 14 to book an annual health check with their GP. These check-ups can help detect medical problems early, give people a chance to talk through any worries they may have, and shape the individual's Health Action Plan which ensures they're getting the

Next up, we held our very own 'My Smile' competition during National Smile Month – a contest which had us grinning from ear to ear. We asked the people we support to send us photos and drawings of their pearly whites and were absolutely overwhelmed by the response. We received over 50 photographs and artworks which were judged by a panel made up of Tom from Acacia Hall, Phoebe from Tigh Coilean, and our new manager, Becky Sansom from Tigh Bruadair.

After some diligent deliberation, the panel chose three winners - Teneisha from An Caladh, because of her beaming smile, Saikou from Hawthorr House, and Pierre from The Old Vic – both of whom clearly kept their teeth in tip top condition.

Most recently, we challenged our colleagues and the people we support to tackle the mammoth task of collectively clocking up 20 MILLION steps. That's the equivalent of walking around the globe! Each week, participants received updates which showed where in the world they had reached, and we're delighted to report that they had smashed their target by the end of August. A huge well done to everyone who took part.

The therapeutic sessions also promote emotional regulation, reduce anxiety, and help Jonathon to relax, while incorporating sensory integration and processing.

For someone who can find the world overwhelming and isolating, music offers a unique channel through which he can communicate and connect with others

Since the very first session, Jonathon has shown enormous interest in choosing instruments and participating in musical dialogue. His vocalisations and eye contact clearly reflect his enjoyment, showing that he can relax and, in turn, regulate more effectively. His musical skill and creativity have also come on leaps and bounds, demonstrating sophistication in his playing and attuned interactions when collaborating musically with Andrei.



Having worked together regularly, Andrei is now greeted by a warm smile and is delighted by Jonathon's enthusiasm for each session. His passion and imagination shines through, and his willingness to expand his experience by trying new things is proof positive of the power of music to bring about long-term change.




Swinderby School learners graduated in style this summer!

During an uplifting ceremony, learners were recognised for their enormous achievements – ranging from increased participation in the local community, to helping to run the school tuck shop.


